Our recent Maths workshop for parents experienced a lower-than-anticipated attendance. However, we remain committed to parental engagement and will reschedule the workshop next half term at 2:30pm, hoping for increased participation. We are also going to send out a poll to see what time of day would be more suited for the majority of parents as we completely understand that work and life can sometimes get in the way of attending these events.

This week, our Heads of School, Elliott and Katy, conducted EYFS tours, demonstrating exceptional leadership and communication skills. Their confidence and eloquence were remarkable, with prospective parents offering overwhelmingly positive feedback. Comments such as "this school feels and looks so lovely" and observations about our pupils' remarkable eye contact and communication skills were particularly nice to hear.

I was immensely proud as Katy and Elliott independently selected the narrative about our school. During the tours, our pupils were asked questions in class by our visitors, speaking with clarity and enthusiasm about their learning experiences. I have been proud of our sporting achievements this week too. Our Year 6 Tag Rugby team competed in their first tournament, securing a commendable 4th position out of 7 teams. CLASSROOM NEWS...

YEAR 3

This week in maths, we persevered with our adding across 10, it was tricky, but we didn't give up and made fantastic progress! In English, we finished our story openings for Tuuli's Adventure and wrote them up beautifully so they can be displayed in the school library for everyone to enjoy. In history, we explored Iron Age hill forts and learned why they were used before writing a "day in the life" as an Iron Age child. We really got into character and even acted some of our ideas out! During PE, we continued to develop our teamwork skills in netball, using our defending and attacking skills in exciting games. We've been working so hard and are really looking forward to practicing our free verse poetry next week!

YEAR 4

This week in Year 4, we wrote fantastic instructions on 'How to Build a Campfire' for the Bocking Scouts, rolling them into scrolls for their next adventure. We began our poetry unit, creating Haikus about nature. In Maths, we've been mastering the column method for addition and subtraction, including tricky exchanges, and even using a new choral answering trick from Year 6. We completed our Year 4 city settlement models using hot glue guns and saws, making sturdy buildings, with more details to be added next week. In PE, we played hockey tournaments, practising defending and attacking skills to score goals. In geography, we have been learning about 4 and 6 figure grid references to enhance our map skills.

YEAR 5

This week in Year 5, we had an exciting Art Day on Monday where we continued to learn to draw intricate Celtic knots and some impressive interweaving designs—demonstrating great skill, patience, and attention to detail. In history, we explored the fascinating Sutton Hoo, and we encourage you to ask your child what was found there and what it reveals about the past. In maths, we are mastering column addition and subtraction, using the inverse to check our answers; why not test us at home with up to 5-digit calculations including exchanges? Our English lessons focused on poetry, where we used wonderful literary devices like metaphors, personification, similes, alliteration, and onomatopoeia. The adults are so impressed by the Norse myths that the children produced at the end of the Talk for Writing unit and we will be sending their work to Tony Bradman, author of Viking Boy. Meanwhile, our Royal Opera House workshops on Hansel and Gretel are unfolding beautifully, and we can't wait to share the performance with parents once it is staged. Keep up the hard work Year Five—remember our mantra: do more, work harder, be neater!

YEAR 6

Year 6 have been busy writing our own mystery narratives which we took to the church to share with adults in the community. We have also written poetry in a very short time frame, focussing on Wiliam Blake's Tyger Tyger. In Maths, we have been doing long multiplication and long division- we have found it pretty hard. In RE, we learned about Martin Luther King and how he fought for people's rights. In history, we all did really well in answering our enquiry question: Who has had the most impact on our local area. We have loved our PE lessons with 2 different coaches and we got to do gymnastics and netball matches. Year 6 are really excited for our residential- this is an understatement! Please be aware that the gates open at 8:35, and your child is marked late, affecting their attendance from 8:50am. Punctuality is a valuable lifelong skill.

Late arrival affects not only the pupil who is late but disrupts the whole class. Where a pupil arrives after the registers close, with no justifiable reason, a U code will be entered into the register. The U code amounts to an unauthorised absence for the whole session. We must warn you, a penalty notice may be issued where there have been at least ten sessions of unauthorised absence during a rolling 10 school week period.
