We've been busy mark-making in our art house and whipping up mud pies to serve in our Gruffalo café. In topic we have really enjoyed learning about sea creatures, especially discovering fun facts about sharks and creating our own shark pictures using newspaper. We're excited to see what more we'll learn next week about life in the ocean! Alongside our topic, in Literacy we have been learning the story of The Rainbow Fish'. We created our own Rainbow Fish show, each playing a different part in the story using creative actions





### YEAR 1

We have had a very creative week in Year 1 with lots of Art lessons. We used our artistic skills to create maps for Stick Man's journey and have also continued with our pointillism art work. This meant we have to wait if someone else is talking before adding our own point. Our reading scheme continued this skill when we all read a part of the story 'Lost'. The person next to us continued afterwards, waiting until we had finished to start. This was a fun new skill. ### **ONLINE SAFETY..**

Whats App:

What are the risks?

There's a risk of bullying, particularly in group chats

There's a risk of seeing content of a sexual nature, or showing violence and hatred

There's a threat to safety if your child shares their live location, particularly with people they don't know in person

They may receive spam or hoax messages

In group chats, any users who aren't in your child's contacts can see messages they post in the group, and your child will be able to see messages they post

Remind your child to talk to you about the things they have seen online, and try to remain calm and reassuring – one of the main reasons children will be reluctant to report online incidents is a fear of 'getting into trouble'.

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Please be aware that the gates open at 8:35, and your child is marked late, affecting their attendance from 8:50am. Punctuality is a valuable lifelong skill.

Late arrival affects not only the pupil who is late but disrupts the whole class. Where a pupil arrives after the registers close, with no justifiable reason, a U code will be entered into the register.

The U code amounts to an unauthorised absence for the whole session. Wel must warn you, a penalty notice may be issued where there have been at least ten sessions of unauthorised absence during a rolling 10 school week period.
